by Duncan Macmillan, with Jonny Donahoe featuring Stephen Thorne, directed by Angela Brazil (September 11 - 28)

SYNOPSIS – You're six years old. Mum's in hospital. Dad says she's "done something stupid." She finds it hard to be happy. So you start to make a list of everything that's brilliant about the world. Everything that's worth living for:

- 1. Ice cream.
- 2. Kung Fu movies.
- 3. Burning things.
- 4. Laughing so hard you shoot milk out your nose.
- 5. Construction cranes.
- 6. Me.

You leave it on her pillow. You know she's read it because she's corrected your spelling. Soon, the list will take on a life of its own. A play about depression and the lengths we will go to for those we love.

This play is largely inspired by classic horror anthologies like Creepshow, Tales from the Crypt, and of course, Are You Afraid of the Dark? It's been developed as a sort of experiment to test the potential and possibilities of the horror genre in live theatre.

Three sisters return to their childhood home on the eve of their mother's funeral. As they share stories, clash over contradictions, and unearth long-buried resentments, the sisters struggle with how differently each remembers the same past. Partners and lovers are drawn into the fray, complicating loyalties and revealing how memory can be both a comfort and a weapon. Stephenson's play balances humor and poignancy in its exploration of grief, family, and the fragile, unreliable narratives that shape our lives.

Rhode Island Premiere CLYDE'S

by Lynn Nottage directed by Jeff Church (March 19 - April 12)

In *Clyde's*, a truck stop sandwich shop offers its formerly incarcerated kitchen staff a shot at redemption. Even as the shop's callous owner tries to keep them down, the staff members learn to reclaim their lives, find purpose, and become inspired to dream by their shared quest to create the perfect sandwich.
